

Farm Service Agency Programs

By now, everyone has most likely cleaned up much of the damage caused by Hurricane Irma. As you review your time sheets or invoices, please be aware that Farm Service Agency (FSA) may be able to help with some of the cleanup costs under their Emergency Conservation Program (ECP). The program covers some costs associated with debris removal, filling gullies, restoring fences and conservation structures. The program does not include reimbursement for removing damaged citrus trees.

The FSA does have a "Tree Assistance Program" that was part of the 2014 Farm Bill that helps with citrus tree replacement. The program does have limitations and conditions.

Worker Protection Standards – Train the Trainer, December 12, Wauchula

A training session will be conducted from 1:00 to 5:00 PM at the Hardee County Extension Service Office in Wauchula on Tuesday, December 12. The session will cover the worker protection standards (WPS) information required under the rule to train employees as either pesticide handlers or workers.

Four (4) continuing education units (CEUs) will be offered to individuals with restricted use pesticide licenses in the private, ag row, ag tree, forestry, ornamental & turf, or soil & greenhouse fumigation categories.

If you were trained under the old rule (prior to 2017) as a trainer, you must be retrained under the new rule to be able to train your workers or handlers under the new WPS guidelines.

Flower Bud Advisory

Dr. Albrigo is suggesting that this winter season is going to be a La Niña winter with lower than average cool temperature accumulation and lower rainfall. Therefore, growers should watch as the season progresses and determine if any production practices like withholding irrigation or making application of growth regulators or urea sprays may be applicable to aid in inducing bloom in the spring of the years. All these options will be discussed in this and future advisory reports that are available on the above-mentioned site.

Winter Weather Watch Program

The 2017-18 edition of the Polk County Winter Weather Watch program will begin on November 15,

2017. The program provides growers with winter weather forecast information specifically geared toward agricultural interests in West Central and Southwest Florida. The program provides subscribers with an unlisted phone number for (24 hour/7 days a week) access to daily weather forecasts. The zone forecasts are from the National Weather Service (NWS) and are listed on the automated phone menu, so you can select the products you are interested in.

Forecasts include the zone forecasts, 6 to 10 and 8 to 14-day outlook forecasts. In addition to the forecasts, special weather narratives are provided as needed in the event of freezing temperatures and a weekly outlook is provided by meteorologist Fred Crosby.

When freezing temperatures are predicted in our area, additional updates will include the afternoon zone forecast and the modified sunset brunt minimum temperature equation. Additionally, weekly citrus leaf freezing temperatures and the 2017-18 Winter Weather Watch manual will also be provided as part of the subscription. You will also have access to weather data from seven Polk County Citrus Extension Weather Stations.

Subscriptions for the Winter Weather Watch program is \$100.00 for the entire 4-month period (November 15 to March 15).

The "Winter Weather Watch" area includes forecasts for Pasco, Hillsborough, Polk, Highlands, Hardee, Manatee, Sarasota, DeSoto, Charlotte, Lee, Glades, Hendry and Inland Collier counties.
