

#### 2016-17 Edition of the

#### Winter Weather Watch

The 2016-17 edition of the Polk County Winter Weather Watch Program will begin on November 15, 2016. The program provides growers with winter weather forecast information specifically geared toward agricultural interests in West Central and Southwest Florida. The program provides subscribers with an unlisted phone number for (24 hour/7 days a week) access to daily weather forecasts. The zone forecasts are from the National Weather Service (NWS) and are listed on the automated phone menu, so you can select the products you are interested in. Forecasts include the zone forecasts, 6-10 and 8-14 day outlook forecasts. In addition to the forecasts, we have special weather narratives provided (by our retired NWS meteorologist, Fred Crosby) as needed in the event of freezing temperatures and a weekly outlook. When freezing temperatures are predicted in our area, additional updates will include the afternoon zone forecast and the modified sunset brunt minimum

temperature equation. If this is not enough, we will also provide the weekly citrus leaf freezing temperatures and the 2016-17 Winter Weather Watch Manual. You will also have access to weather data from seven Polk County Citrus Extension Weather Stations.

Subscriptions for the Winter Weather Watch Program are only \$100.00 for the entire 4 month period (Nov 15 to Mar 15). You can subscribe to the Winter Weather Watch by completing and returning the enclosed "subscription form".

## Products Containing Sulfoxaflor

Dow AgroSciences provided the following information on insecticides containing sulfoxaflor: On October 14, 2016, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) re-established the registration for products containing sulfoxaflor (Isoclast® Active): Transform® WG, Closer® SC and Sequoia® insecticides.

Dow AgroSciences is pleased to have registrations for these important brands re-established. This registration limits the crops available under previous product labeling, has a downwind buffer zone included and restricts tank-mixing with products containing certain active ingredients. This re-established registration will allow for post-bloom usage on potatoes, pome fruit, stone fruit, grapes and tree nuts. Season-long uses will be permitted on lettuce and wheat. Dow AgroSciences is working diligently to provide EPA the information it needs to authorize previously labeled uses in other important crops and have buffer zones and tank-mix restrictions removed in the future.

Previously issued FIFRA Section 18 Specific Emergency Exemptions remain in place for cotton and sorghum until they expire. Section 18 labeled products may continue to be utilized and sold according to those labels and should not be returned to Dow AgroSciences.

Note: citrus is not included in the list of renewed uses.



#### Worker Protection Standard

#### Worker Training Online

If you only need to train workers (and not handlers) for the new Worker Protection Standard (WPS) I have just learned of a website from Iowa State University that can provide this training on line at no cost. Remember if you will need to train workers and handlers, then you will need to take the complete EPA approved WPS Train the Trainer course as offered in Bartow or Plant City.

#### NOAA's Official 2016-17

#### Winter Weather Outlook

Forecasters at NOAA's Climate Prediction Center issued the U.S. Winter Outlook today, saying that La Nina is expected to influence winter conditions this year. The Climate Prediction Center issued a La Nina watch this month, predicting the climate phenomenon is likely to develop in late fall or early winter. La Nina favors drier, warmer winters in the southern U.S. and wetter, cooler conditions in the northern U.S. If La Nina conditions materialize, forecasters say it should be weak and potentially short-lived.

"This climate outlook provides the most likely outcome for the upcoming winter season, but it also provides the public with a good reminder that winter is just up ahead and it's a good time to prepare for typical winter hazards, such as extreme cold and snowstorms," said Mike Halpert, deputy director, NOAA's Climate Prediction Center. "Regardless of the outlook, there is always some chance for extreme winter weather, so

prepare now for what might come later this winter."

Other factors that often play a role in the winter weather include the Arctic Oscillation, which influences the number of arctic air masses that penetrate into the South and create nor'easters on the East Coast, and the Madden-Julian Oscillation, which can affect the number of heavy rain events in the Pacific Northwest.

The 2016 U.S. Winter Outlook (December through February):

#### Precipitation

- Wetter than normal conditions are most likely in the northern Rockies, around the Great Lakes, in Hawaii and in western Alaska
- Drier than normal conditions are most likely across the entire southern U.S. and southern Alaska.

#### **Temperature**

- Warmer than normal conditions are most likely across the southern U.S., extending northward through the central Rockies, in Hawaii, in western and northern Alaska and in northern New England.
- Cooler conditions are most likely across the northern tier from Montana to western Michigan.
- The rest of the country falls into the "equal chance" category, meaning that there is not a strong enough climate signal in these areas to shift the odds, so they have an equal chance for above, near-, or below-normal temperatures and/or precipitation.

#### **Annual Tractor Rodeo Rules**

To compete in the team competition, the completed pre-registration form must be received in the Extension Office by October 28, 2016.

This year, the team competition will be determined by the score and ranking of single individuals from a company. The highest company individual score and rankings from each competition will determine the team winners. All participants will also compete as individuals for the events they enter.

#### **Tractor Rodeo Competitions**

The **Sprayer Operator Competition** will test precession, safety awareness, and attention to detail required for safe pesticide applications using a tractor with a sprayer.

The **Herbicide Operator Competition** will test for the above mentioned skills on a tractor with a boom sprayer.

In the **Fertilizer Spread-Off**, operators will simulate fertilizer applications to resets scattered randomly through a grove. The operator will be provided with an all-terrain utility vehicle (ATV), bucket of simulated fertilizer, and cups to apply the fertilizer. 




